How to Solve Four Parking Problems

The problems are:

- Queues form on the west side of Regency Square and block the road for through traffic when the car park is full.
- There are not enough resident parking spaces locally.
- Regency Square looks a mess because it has too many parked vehicles.
- The Regency Square car park is almost empty most of the time.

We have decided to present a petition to the Council aimed at solving these four problems. The petition will ask the Council to

- Remove the parking bays next to the green on the west side of Regency Square, to prevent the queues that block the road.
- Remove corresponding parking bays on the east side, to improve the appearance of the square.
- Create resident parking spaces in the Regency Square car park to replace the resident bays

- removed from the square, and to create additional new resident spaces.
- Make improvements to the car park so it is more pleasant and safer to use.

Councillor Jason Kitkat supports our scheme and has agreed to present the petition to the Council on our behalf.

There will of course be technical problems, such as how to allow residents permit holders to use the car park without paying cash. Solutions can surely be found to those problems if there is political support for the scheme.

So, what we need now is enough signatures to convince the Council that there is a demand for it.

A petition form is enclosed with this newsletter. If you agree with the scheme, please sign it and return it to the address shown. There are several spaces, so perhaps you could get family, flat mates or neighbours to sign as well.

We will also be sending the petition to everyone on the electoral roll in the area, and we will probably also do some door knocking – so apologies in advance if you get asked several times.

Brunswick Square has benefitted from a lot of regeneration funding. It would probably be unwise to expect any funding of this kind for our square in the present economic conditions.

Hopefully that will change, and when it does we need to be ready with some good ideas. What could be done to improve the appearance of Regency Square and restore it to something like its former glory?

There are lots of ideas around, such as new railings, new paving stones, planting trees, filling in the car park etc.

We need someone with some technical knowledge and an understanding of Regency design and townscape, to look at the possibilities and prepare an outline proposal for what could be done, if money was available.

Graffiti Report

The Society's large tin of cream paint was opened for the first time last month. The occasion was the appearance of a large black daub at the bottom of Queensbury Mews opposite the back door of Abbotts. It has now been painted out.

West Pier Hoardings Painted

The hoardings round the former rock shop on the West Pier have now been painted white, which may be a small improvement on their previous appearance. The West Pier Trust has plans to put an information sign on the fencing, like the one currently on the hoarding round the nearby bandstand.

The cost of closing off the root end of the pier was funded by Marks Barfield, the architects who hope to build the i360 viewing tower. We asked whether they had considered dismantling the rock shop and putting it into storage. The idea had been considered but was found to be too costly.

Meanwhile Society committee members are hoping to have a meeting with officers of the Trust soon to talk about the current state of play on the i360 project. We certainly hope that the unsightly mess now at the bottom of the square does not become a long term fixture.

Petition to Brighton and Hove City Council regarding parking in Regency Square

We, the undersigned ask the Council to

- remove the parking spaces adjacent to the green on the west side of Regency Square, in order to prevent tailbacks, which occur when the car park is full and which disrupt through traffic;
- remove the corresponding spaces on the east side of the square in order to improve the appearance of the square, which has too many parked vehicles;
- replace the resident spaces lost as a result of these changes, and create some additional new resident spaces, inside the Regency Square car park, thus increasing the number of resident spaces available and making better use of the car park, which is often largely empty;
- 4 take steps to improve the appearance and security of the Regency Square car park so that more people will use it.

SUMMER OUTING SUNDAY 5TH JULY 2009 COWDRAY HOUSE AND HISTORIC MIDHURST

The summer outing is to see Cowdray House and a walk around Historic Midhurst. In the morning we visit Cowdray House at Midhurst. This is one of Southern England's most important early Tudor courtiers houses, visited by King Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth I. Partly destroyed by fire in 1793, its magnificent ruins are set in the stunning landscaped grounds of Cowdray Park. It has just received £3M of lottery money for its conservation and is one of the most important restoration projects undertaken in recent times. It was home to the Viscounts Montague, who were prominent Catholics and their connections with Guy Fawkes, who was employed within the household, resulted in a heavy fine and 40 weeks' imprisonment in the Tower of London for the 2nd Viscount. In the 18th century the Park was landscaped by Capability Brown. During the civil war the House was sequestrated by the Parliamentarians and converted into a barrack for the Roundheads. In the same year as the fire the 8th Viscount was drowned in the Rhine and the last 2 sons of the Montague dynasty were drowned in a boating accident in 1815. These tragedies were said to be result of the fabled fulfilment of the Cowdray Curse. A full conducted tour will be given. The House was painted by Turner and Constable in the 19th century and was mentioned in William Cobbett's "Rural Rides" in 1830.

Lunch will be at the 16th century Wheatsheaf Inn in the centre of Midhurst. After lunch Michael Robins will give a conducted tour of the town. Midhurst has over 100 listed buildings. It developed into a market town from a Motte and Bailey Castle and is full of Medieval, Georgian and Victorian buildings.

Our tour guide Michael Robins (01273 773052) will accompany the outing.
