As far as is known the Prince Regent never honoured Regency Square with a visit, so it remains a bit of a mystery as to its name.

The nearest touch of the high and mighty seems to have been when the Duchess of St. Albans settled in the square - she was thought to have been the richest woman in England - that must have attracted some rare characters.


No place for the miller by the sea with all that lovely land to build on, and so we have him carted off; forty oxen to do the job, up the hill and far away.

FREE AREA

The Council has now provided the Society with a plan showing the proposed dog free area in Regency Square.

The proposal is to fence the centre green, using steel railings similar to those already in place. The Committee has discussed this idea in some detail. Some members wanted the top green to be fenced rather than the middle one. However, the majority view was that it would be fairest and most pleasant looking if it was the middle one.

Two members of the committee will be going to see the Director of Parks and Gardens to let him know our views.
