WHAT IS HAPPENING IN REGENCY MEWS?

Those who live near to Regency Mews are concerned about the future of the old Dutton Foreshaw garage.

We have sucessfully prevented NCP from turning it into a carpark. We have just heard that they have sold the site to a private developer who is likely to apply for permission to use it for industrial purposes.

In the meantime a seperate planning application has been made to use the main garage building as an ice-skating rink, leaving a large portion of the site for industrial and other development.

The three Regency Ward Councillors have tabled a Motion to the Council with our conditional support to develop the site for Residential Mixed Housing. The Council are still investigation this proposition and we are urging them not to grant planning permission for a skating rink or industrial purposes until the housing proposition has been fully investigated.

THE CONSERVATION ADVISORY PLANNING COMMITTEE

Howard Ward our Committee Member who has represented our Society on this committee fell and broke his hip and after the operation damaged his back. We wish him a speedy recovery. Until Howard is well again Mrs S Dean has agreed to attend the Advisory Committee, presenting our views and keeping us informed of all planning applications affecting our area.

BUSES IN RUSSELL SOUARE?

After the NCP scare anything is possible. Well there aren't any buses in Russell Square yet but if the Council's latest ideas are put into practice there could be, at least at the Cannon Place end.

The Council wants to open up the top of Cannon Place from Western Road so that buses can turn down there and then go through the car park under Churchill Square. This will make it easier for them to turn round if their journey terminates in Churchill Square.

However it will make the bad traffic conditions in Cannon Place even worse. No definate plans have been published yet but the society is keeping the situation under close watch.

FOOTBALL RULES-OH NO

I this sunny weather there is nothing nicer than to lie in the sun on Regency Square. But beware: if you close your eyes you may get a rude awakening from a football landing on your head.

The top green is nicely fenced off and free of dogs. As a result it is ideal for lying in the sun or letting toddlers toddle. But recently, in spite of NO FOOTBALL notices, there have been fast and furious games in progress.

Please renew your subscription if you want to continue as a member and go on recieving the newsletters. The Society is only effective because it has a large membership.



A BROARDER VIEW OF BRIGHTON

Our Societies affiliation to the Brighton Society has resulted in gaining information about developments in Brighton outside our area but never the less concern all of us.

The Jubilee Site. We have already reported on the situation regarging this development and we are still waiting for the date of the public enquiry.

The Station site development.
This is an area of approximately
64 acres. We have expressed the opinior
that this area should be mainly
used to to house Brighton people,
extension to the colleges and small
workshops.

Two developers have submitted proposals. One for a supermarket complex with some housing and the other for office development with some housing. Both allow for extention to the educatioal buildings.

Both these schemes contravene the Council's own planning brief and we are suporting the Brighton Society objections to these proposals.

BLOCKING OUT THE SEA VIEW

The artists display boards erected by the Council were removed from outside the Norfolk Hotel because of protests and re-erected in front of the West Pier as a temporary experiment.

This is the second year that these boards have obstructed the sea view of many of the houses and hotels along the front and in Regency Square.

This year the boards have only been part filled and as they are an eyesore should be removed.

If the artists still want the display boards and they are considered a tourist attraction why not put them on the enlarged lower promenade.

If you agree that these boards should be moved we urge you to write and say so to: The Executive Officer at the Town Hall.
