SKYLINE SAVED

A SMALL SUCCESS IN REGENCY MEWS

When the Regency mews site first came on the mnarket the Society campaigned for the Council to develop it as housing for all types of people including some sheltered accommodation.

That proved to be impossible. The site was eventually bought by Hargreaves Construction. They have now finally won planning permission for an office and town house development.

But not before the society had discovered that their original plan was for a building that would be visible from the seafront above the houses in Regency Square. We estimated it would be about 1.5 metres above the roof line.

They submitted new plans showing a reduction in height of just under 1.4 metres. Who can say whether that is enough to hide the building?

We were not confident so we asked the planning committee not to give approval for the specific height shown, but to impose a general condition that the building must not be visible.


This appears to be what they have done. They have also imposed other conditions that we asked for. We are waiting to receive the full wording of the permission. Details in the next newsletter.

So on paper we have won a victory. We must now wait and see what we can see when the building is up. We have taken a series of photographs of the square from various angles. So there will be no dispute about what the view was before the building was built.

BEHIND THE SCENES

The shops in Western Road all look very smart as you walk past the fronts. Go round the back into Clarence Square and you get a different picture.

Some shops seem to think that the street outside their back doors doesn't matter. So they leave unsightly rubbish piled on steps, in gardens and sometimes even in the street itself.



But Clarence Square does matter. People live there. It has an attractive garden in the centre. Visitors to the town wander through in their thousands.

We think the traders in western road should help clean up Clarence Square.

EMPTY HOTELS

The Council has a policy of increasing the number of hotel bedrooms in the town to enable Brighton to compete with other conference towns like Bournemouth.

One way they do this is to deny planning permission to hotel owners wnating to convert their properties into flats.

The result is empty or run down hotels. There are three examples in our area, the George IV and Portland House in Regency Square and the Churchill Centre in Russell Square.

An application to convert the George IV to flats was withdrawn after long delays by the Planning Committee in reaching a decision.

The Society has taken up this issue. We had a useful discussion with Councillor Andy Winter who represents Regency Ward and is a member of the Planning Committee.

We are hopeful that the Council is begining to change its attitude and look at each application on its merits rather than applying a blanket policy.

First evidence is their decision to give permission for half of the Portland House Hotel to be converted to flats. The development will also include three new town houses in Queensbury Mews.
