Enquiries have been made by residents to the Council, who are unable to take any action themselves. It is only the owners who can act to evict squatters and at present the owners have not been traced.



TOW AWAY SCHEME TO BE REVIEWED

We have complained to the Police about the policy of not towing illegally parked cars away from residents' spaces. One of our members walked round Regency Square recently and counted 8 cars parked illegally in resident spaces.

The present contract with the firm that does the towing away is due for renewal next August. Before then the Police and the Council will be reviewing the scheme and will consider, amongst other things, the use of clamps instead of towing away.

MONEY TO GIVE AWAY

Property owners in Regency Square are being offered money by the Council.

Grants are available to help with the maintenance and improvement of old buildings in conservation areas. Apparently not all the money has been allocated since the Council is writing to property owners suggesting what improvements they might make.

One member was surprised to receive a letter suggesting that the roof of his house could be renewed: he was surprised because a new roof had been fitted 12 months ago!

Perhaps some of the spare money could be used to help improve number 32 Regency Square which is in serious need of re-decoration.
