

## TWO RULES ON CONSERVATION

There seem to be two rules when it comes to conservation, one for property owners and one for the Council.

If you own a listed building, any work you do on the façade must be in keeping with its original design. If it is part of one of the uniform painting schemes, there are strict rules about what colour you can paint the house and railings.

But, if you are the Council and you are putting new street name signs up in a conservation area, you can apparently use inappropriate modern signs. Look at the one at the south east corner of Regency Square as an example: It has modern lettering and no black border.

The other signs for Regency Square have recently gone missing so we have asked the Council to replace them with traditionally designed ones.

## THE EARLY DAYS OF TOWN PLANNING

The area around Brunswick Square in Hove is one of the earliest examples of town planning.

The Brunswick Town did not develop at random, as did most English towns. It was planned as a town from the start.

Much of the credit for this goes to Charles Busby, the architect who designed and implemented the plans.

Nick Tyson has undertaken the ambitious task of restoring one of the houses Busby designed. It is number 13 Brunswick Square. Every aspect of the house is being restored as closely to the original as possible.

Once it is complete, Nick hopes that it can be opened as a show place for visitors. In the meantime he spends many of his weekends showing small groups around the work in progress. To arrange a visit call Brighton 206306. There is a charge for the tour of £3 per head.

It will also be possible to meet Nick Tyson at our social evening at 7-30 pm on Friday 18 October at the metropole Hotel (York Room). He will be presenting a talk about Busby and the development of the Brunswick area, illustrated with slides.

#### BANNERS BANNED

The Fitness factory in Castle Street has fitted two large advertising banners to the front of its building without planning permission.

When there is a high wind they flap against the wall causing a loud noise. At night this causes disturbance to people living in the street.

The Council has refused planning permission for the banners but the Fitness Factory has appealed against the decision. So now the Secretary of State will be called upon to make a decision.

The Society has written to the Secretary of State supporting the Council's refusal. We believe that Castle Street is a residential street and those businesses which are located in it must be made to respect the rights of people who live there.

This is not the first time that the Secretary of State has been asked to decide a planning issue in Castle Street. The Castle Snooker Club wanted to extend its opening hours at night but permission was refused.
