

Castle Street: Development . . .

A planning application has been made for the demolition of a 40-41 Castle Street and the erection of a new block of 12 flats.

The building to be demolished has been used in the past as a motor cycle showroom and a music shop but is now empty.

The Society has always taken the view that the residential nature of Castle Street should be preserved and for that reason we welcome the proposed conversion from commercial to residential use.

On the other hand we are concerned at the potential impact on the small houses in Clarence Gardens which back onto the site. We are consulting members affected and will put forward comments taking account of their views.

... and Dereliction

Apart from numbers 40-41, several other properties in Castle Street are boarded up.

Number 37 has been derelict since it was squatted. Numbers 4 and 9 and a house nearby in Stone Street are also boarded up.

This is very depressing for people living in the street. It is also unacceptable in one of the town's major conservation areas.

We have asked the Council if anything can be done.

Cables and Boxes

Clarence and Russell Squares will soon be dug up to lay cables for cable TV.

Distribution boxes will also need to be installed on the pavement, one for every 60 households.

Nynex, the company laying the cable proposed three locations:

By the railing at the eastern end of Russell Square

By the side door of 28 Russell Square

In the road linking the two squares

Society committee members had a meeting with Nynex to discuss these locations. We persuaded them to move the first which could spoil the view of the garden: it will now be further up Cannon Place by the side wall of the sandpiper guesthouse.

We suggested that the one in the link road might be better on the north side of Clarence Square which is already rather a mess and where the pavements are not quite so narrow. This is not technically possible.

There is already some sort of distribution box in the third location near to the entrance to Russell Mews. No one seems to know what it is and it looks fairly old and unused. We are trying to find out if it can be removed.

Nynex have promised to consult us when they are planning the cabling of Regency Square. No date has been set yet which means it will not be until 1994 at the earliest.

Thanks to the Bench Cleaners

Thanks to the two members who gave up time on two Sunday mornings to rub down and oil the Society's two benches at the top of Regency Square.

If you compare the condition of our benches with the larger ones belonging to the Council you can see that the work is worth doing. One year we had so many volunteers that we were actually able to clean the Council ones as well.



St John Ambulance in Regency Square

Society member Terry Wing is divisional superintendent for the new Regency Division of St John Ambulance which has been established to provide community care.

All those involved are volunteers. Their work includes transporting the ill or dis-abled, caring for those who wish to die at home and assisting others to live life to the full by helping them to go night clubbing or shopping. The division also works closely with the various HIV and AIDS organisations.

Unlike the conventional uniforms of St John first aiders, Regency Division volunteers wear white sweatshirts and black jeans: they prefer individuality rather than uniformity.

St John Ambulance is funded entirely by public donations. The Regency Division urgently needs

an ambulance (£30,000 new)

a car to transport patients to hospital or hospice

an HQ building for meetings, training etc

a garage for vehicles (at least 10 ft high).

more volunteers, especially those who might be available during the day - qualified nurses or people with no training are equally welcome.
