

Lights at the end of the Pier

The Brighton West Pier Trust invited the mayor to switch on lights along the pier earlier this month. The Trust chairman, Sir Lindsay Bryson said that they will stay on "through thick and thin" until the pier is restored.

But are there any lights visible at the end of the tunnel as far as the pier's future is concerned?

The answer seems to be yes. At the Trust's AGM last month there was a real feeling that things are moving forward.

£1 million has already been spent on emergency work and on providing an access link from the land. This money came mainly from the National Lottery. A feasibility study is now being made by accountants.

The purpose of the study is to find out if commercial operations on the pier will be able to generate enough income to maintain the structure. If the answer is yes then a further £4.2m of Lottery money will become available for the next stage of the repairs.

The interesting question for those of us who live near the pier is, what sort of commercial activity will there be. At the moment there is no answer to that. The Trust chairman has mentioned various possibilities such as a casino, a hotel, shops and restaurants. The truth is that no one will know what will really happen on the pier until a developer actually signs up to develop it. However, the trust has laid down some conditions which they intend to impose on any commercial operator of the pier:

- the pier and the buildings on it must be returned to their 1920's external appearance.
- the general public should have access to the full length of the pier.
- the usage's of the restored pier must include artistic and educational activities.
- the Trust will retain responsibility for the long term stewardship of the pier, including maintenance of the structure

Meanwhile plans are in hand to open a visitors centre in the arches near the pier. The trust is also raising money by running guided tours of the pier every Thursday at 3pm, but places are limited so you should book ahead (tel 321499). A donation of £15 is suggested (£10 for Trust members).

"Not just railings and roses"

The Council recently asked us to fill in a questionnaire about how we would like to see the area regenerated. The results were summarised in a previous newsletter.

"Not just railings and roses" is the name of the Council's report on the results. The title is a quote from one of the many comments which people wrote after ticking their answers to questions. These comments are all listed in the report. One or two certainly deserve wider publication.

For example, one person suggested that the Regency Square car park should be "blocked off with the NCP Chairman inside."

Someone else said "No provision for vandals" but it is not quite clear what sort of provision they had in mind.

One person in Russell Square described their neighbours as "tenants from hell."

What is going to happen?

As reported recently, the Council hopes to collect enough funds to spend about half a million pounds on Russell, Clarence, Regency and Bedford Squares. Work on the first two will be done in 1997. Regency Square will be a bigger project and therefore more time will be needed to deal with it. Work will start in 1998.

Exactly what will be done is still to be decided. Our chairman is a member of the group set up by the Council to review the proposed schemes so we will keep you informed as news becomes available.

Remembering the railings

One idea for Regency Square is to replace the original railings. The trouble is that the Council officers are not sure exactly what they looked like. So they are keen to get hold of old photographs with railings visible.
