Changes in the Car Park

The Council took over management of the Regency Square car park recently from NCP.

Some fees for parking are to be changed. There will be a new, one hour rate of £2, plus a flat rate fee of £4.50 between 6pm and midnight.

These new lower fees might help local restaurants attract customers, though Preston Street Traders chairman Angelo Martinoli thinks that a £3 evening rate would be more effective.

We have also learnt that the Council has appointed a private security firm to patrol the car park.

While these changes may have some benefit, it seems a pity that the Council is making piecemeal decisions about the car park. We have still not had any response to the Society's petition asking for changes to parking arrangements in the square.

Meanwhile on the roof

We have been promised cycle parking stands at various places in Regency Square. There is still no sign of them. Apparently, because they are to be installed on the roof of the car park, the normal design of stand is not acceptable. So we are waiting for a suitable model to be obtained.

Bollards for the Church

Our picture shows two of the new bollards erected around the old French church in Queensbury Mews. They are intended to stop vehicles parking next to the newly refurbished building and damaging it.

Meanwhile, in Stone Street, the pavement has also been blocked by trade waste bins. The enforcement officer has asked one of the businesses concerned to keep their bin in the road next to the communal bin, so that it does not block the pavement.

The remains of the West Pier Concert Hall have been lying on the seabed ever since the central section of the pier collapsed.

They have now been removed by demolition contractors. This was done to comply with one of the conditions of the planning permission for the i360 development. Meanwhile lack of funding is still holding up the start of real work on the i360.

Society chairman, Roger Hinton was interviewed on BBC local radio earlier this month; He took the opportunity to express the frustration of many local people about the sorry state of the root end of the pier. He also raised the issue at the recent AGM of the West Pier Trust; the Trust chairman promised to talk to the Council about tidying it up.
