

The buildings at the corner of Preston Street and Regency Square have been derelict for years but everything is in place for a big improvement! There are plans for restoring the exterior to something like its original state, and to convert the ground floor and basement into a bar and restaurant.

But the developer also wants to convert the rest of the building into six bed sits with 2 bathrooms!

We have a concern that bedsitters in old buildings can lead to long term structural damage - and the risk of fire and other damage is much greater. Please look at the planning application -BH2012/00329-330.

WEST LAINE WHAT IS IN A NAME?

As you may have read in the Argus Jason Kitkat (leader of Brighton and Hove Council) is keen to regenerate our area. In order to identify the area he has suggested naming it. One of the proposed names is the West Laine (historically this area was know by this name Laine meaning "arable land at the foot of a hill"), this area includes Churchill Square, North up to Upper North Street, West along past Montpelier Road to Norfolk Road then South down to the sea front. The committee met with Jason to discuss the councils plans for the city and our area in particular. The city plans are on view for us all to look at at the Town Hall. Jason is confident that the i360 will go ahead and will take 16 months to complete along with the regeneration of that area, with the arches being opened for small businesses.

NO TO ACCESS

The proposal to access Clarence Square from Western Road has been turned down. The proposal to prevent Russell Square and Clarence Square residents from getting caught in the tail back s from visitors to the car park in Cannon Place has been turned down because the camera located at the entrance to Clarence Square from Western Road does not have number recognition and as this access is prohibited to cars this would be impossible to manage.

MEMBERS REMEMBERED

Andrew Walker

We are sad to report the death last month of Andrew Walker.

Andrew lived in Chartwell Court and was a member of the Society for many years. In his younger years he worked as a journalist with the BBC World Service. He joined the Society committee in 1998 as

Secretary. In 2002 he moved to the job of Treasurer which he did until 2008.

Those who worked with him on the committee will remember his calm and competent dedication to the job in hand, whatever it might be.

He will also be remembered for his part in the Society's Millennium local history project. He researched the history of the immediate area in which he lived. He discovered that what is now a modern Shopping centre had previously been a closely knit local community.

The results of his research were published in a beautifully illustrated book called "Churchill Square revisited, a lost Brighton community". Andrew made no secret of his own views about the changes in the area when he wrote: "The North Laine has shown <u>M</u> what can be achieved when streets are rescued from the developers. What is now Churchill Square might, with a little modernisation, have become an equally interesting area."

Our thoughts are with Andrew's family at this time of loss.
