HELICOPTER RESCUE



On the 28th September at around 5pm a 74 year old man was knocked down outside the Regency Restaurant on the corner of Regency Square and Kings Road. An ambulance helicopter landed on the promenade the other side of the road and took the injured man to the Royal Sussex County Hospital.

The area was cordoned off for several hours so police could gather evidence, forcing traffic to leave Kings Road, driving up Preston Street turning into Regency Square to rejoin Kings Road at the South east corner. The elderly man's injuries were not life threatening but He has sustained serious leg injuries. A 45 year old man has been charged on suspicion of dangerous driving.

GOOD NEWS

Good news on 43 Russell Square and 67 Preston Street. A number of local residents have been worried about what has been happening at these properties. The same developer applied for planning permission to change the whole of 43 Russell Square and part of 67 Preston Street into bedsits with shared bathrooms. Over several months planning applications were made and then withdrawn, making it very difficult to follow what was going on. In the meantime, work was carried out without planning permission, which is in fact a criminal offence. The Council's enforcement team and Conservation Officer have now intervened decisively to stop any further unauthorised work. Proper plans will be submitted and there are indications that the houses might be converted into flats rather than bedsits.

MAGIC MUSHROOMS



If you have been in the Upper Garden in the past few days you will have seen the latest addition to the flora of Regency Square. Is this good news – further evidence of the growing number of species that have taken up residence in the square since our efforts to improve it? Or bad – a dangerous infestation that needs to be dealt with firmly? Hard to say at the present moment. If this is a "Honey Fungus" it is bad news. This is a generic name for a number of species within the Genus Armillaria. They throw out underground rhizomes that can grow at about a meter a day, and devour the roots of many garden plants. They are very persistent so the only way to get rid of them is to remove all plants and earth from the infected area and start again. Bad news! The good news is that they may not be malignant Armillaria. Honey Fungi usually start by infesting dead tree trunks and then move on elsewhere - we have no tree trunks in the middle flower bed! However could the deadly spores have slipped in amongst the wood chippings on the surface of the flower bed? Possibly. We need expert advice. Once the Brighton & Hove Parks Department has moved into action we shall know more. Watch this space!

Some things you may not know about honey fungi. They glow in the dark, and were used in the Middle Ages as a form of home illumination. Luminescent Armillaria rhizomes may be the original Wizard's wand. 8.9 square kilometres of the Melhear National Forest in Oregon is infested with a 2,300 year old colony of Honey Fungus – persistent you see? . The honey fungus is known as the pidpenki in Ukraine - cooked with onions, butter, sour cream and dill it is eaten as a delicacy. (NB- UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD TRY THIS UNLESS YOU HAVE EXPERT
