ALISON THOMSON

Alison, a journalist, and her husband, Jez, an osteopath, have lived in Brighton & Hove since 2002. Alison studied languages at Sussex University in the 1980s, before heading off to the States with student travel company EF, who she first worked for at their Farm Road office in Hove. She's since worked in travel and the arts as a writer and editor, and also volunteers at Citizens Advice.

Since getting elected in May - and winning by one vote! - I've been busy working on issues that affect the ward and beyond, from bin collection to street art, from public transport to our enviable green spaces. I'm on two committees- Culture, Heritage, Sport, Tourism and Economic development, as well as Licensing. I'm also City Centre Renewal Lead, so I'm working hard to see how we can reinvigorate the high street and create an urban environment we can be proud of.

A top priority when I got elected was to address the misery and upset inflicted on so many residents by the bus redirection. As the Western Road Improvement Scheme continues apace, I was happy to report that the buses would go back onto Western Road on August 14, several months ahead of schedule, much to everyone's relief.

The brilliant team behind the i360 have been working hard on new projects. These include the cricket-themed Sixes bar, which opened in early July and quickly proved a hit. Meanwhile, part of the top deck on the prom has been given over to a roller-skating rink. Expect more exciting developments soon!

In mid-July I took part in the Big Tidy Up initiative, where, together with the excellent charity Leave No Trace, we collected 21kg of litter off the beach. Other achievements include repairing and repainting our heritage lampposts. These are an important part of our city's image, so I'm glad we were able to fund this important work.

Works in progress include revitalising empty retail spaces such as Imperial Arcade and seeing the iconic Hippodrome brought back to life, as well as addressing issues such as improvements in health and education and sustainable travel.

I've met a lot people in the past four months - more, I'd say, than I've met in 21 years living here! - and that includes the lovely members of the Regency Squares Community. I've really been impressed by the energy and enthusiasm of so many of you - and it's the case across the ward, with volunteer groups looking after our parks, our beaches and our environment.

This is a great city - with great people - and I hope as your Labour councillor I can continue to do you proud.

I grew up near Brighton and spent a huge amount of my childhood visiting the city. Having now lived here for the past 6 years, I can't think of anywhere else I would rather call home. For work, I'm an Editor in factual television and I've worked for many of the independent production companies in and around Brighton & Hove.

In addition to having the pleasure of being one of the ward councillors for Regency, I sit on the Children, Families, and Schools Committee and am the Opposition Spokesperson for the Equalities, Community Safety, and Human Rights Committee. I'm also the Green Group Spokesperson for Equalities and Workers Rights.







Thank you to the volunteer gardeners for their continued hard work to keep our gardens looking beautiful.

The volunteer gardeners have been working every week, weather permitting, throughout spring and summer. Clarence Square's garden was weeded in mid-summer, all other sessions have been in Regency Square.

With an average turnout of only three volunteers per session, it is impossible to keep Regency Square's borders weed-free. So we focus our efforts on weeding around the healthiest ornamental plants and along the paths. We also take a pragmatic approach: if a weed is attractive and isn't crowding the ornamental plants, we leave it alone. After all, weeds are merely wildflowers in the wrong place. This year, an enormous hemlock seeded itself at one end of the south border. We let it be, only removing it when it threatened to collapse across the path.

The long south border that we re-planted in October 2021 was in reasonably good shape in spring 2023. We planted wildflowers, from the Wildflower Conservation Society at Stanmer, to fill gaps left by two elderly shrubs that died during the winter. Within a mere four days, half of the wildflowers had been dug up by dogs.

Wildflowers are proving generally hard to establish, because the garden borders are so vulnerable to trampling. None of the carefully chosen wild species that we planted last autumn survived beyond the first few weeks of spring. But we have also filled gaps by transplanting, including offshoots (baby plants) of the spiky yellow Yukka.

The Regency Square garden is at its best in spring, when the shrubs are in flower. In high summer it is largely devoid of colour, and looks tired and tatty.

The borders in the upper garden are 20 years old. Much of the original planting is still healthy, but something makes it difficult for garden plants to thrive in the middle sections of the side and south borders.

Under advice from Cityparks, we plan to clear these midsections in the autumn so that they can be returned to low maintenance lawn. Clearing the mid-sections is too big a job for our group, so the Cityparks Ranger's volunteer group will be making a welcome return to the garden to help us.

NOTICED ANYTHING DIFFERENT ON WESTERN ROAD?

Back to 2-way traffic! Mike and I attended a meeting at the Metropole, now Double Tree by Hilton, organised by our new ward councillor Alison Thomson. The meeting was about the roadworks on Western Road but primarily about the bus diversions along Montpelier Road, Montpelier Terrace, Upper North Street and Regent Hill. Also at the meeting was Bella Sankey, leader of the council and Trevor Muten, Chair of the council's Transport Sustainability committee.

The meeting took the form of a Q&A, the new labour council wanting to fully understand peoples' concerns. I have never seen so many angry people; not surprising as buses run from 5am to 2am each day and road closures have lasted many months.

There were no easy answers on the night but the councillors said they would go away and seek solutions. Their plan was to include accelerating the construction work timetable so that the Western Road improvement scheme would restore 2-way traffic 6 months earlier than the previous administration planned and that 14th August would see the opening of both carriageways on Western Road. So far, so good, as the first pledge has been met!

IT'S IN THE POST

Are you like me? I receive no post for several days then suddenly 5 or 6 letters arrive together. I've had messages from others in our community saying similar, that the postal service is very erratic and they no longer get their regular Postie. I decided to email Royal Mail's complaints service to find out why. As an example I gave the instance of our son's Father's Day card posted in Leeds on a Thursday with a 1st class stamp -£1:10 which didn't arrive until the following Wednesday, after Father's Day. The reply was that "while Royal Mail take all complaints seriously and would like to answer your concerns we can only respond to specifics"(?)

One of our members suggests phoning the Royal Mail General Enquiries number 03457 740 740. After pressing a few buttons, you should get through to a person to whom you can complain. I did see our regular Postie in late May; he said he had been off for 6 weeks with an ankle injury and that he was now in a van delivering parcels. A Google search reveals this situation is occurring all across the UK, so not just locally. Royal Mail's response is? ... to increase the price of a 1st class stamp to £1:25 from October 2023.
